



Create Multimedia TB Education Materials and Conduct Community Analysis

EthnoMed is seeking individuals to contribute to an important project funded by the Firland Foundation. This project focuses on developing multimedia TB education materials and conducting thematic and qualitative analysis based on community interviews.

Project Overview

EthnoMed has been awarded a grant to expand and enhance TB education for refugee, immigrant, and migrant communities in King County. This project involves:

- **Creating Multimedia TB Education Materials:** Develop culturally and linguistically tailored resources including:
 - **Podcasts:** Engaging audio content featuring community members, health experts, and providers.
 - **Videos:** Informative videos addressing TB prevention, symptoms, and treatment in various languages.
 - **Print Materials:** Educational brochures and flyers highlighting key TB information in culturally relevant formats.
- **Designing Community Presentations:** Assist in creating presentations for delivery at health fairs, community centers, health conferences, schools, nursing homes, and faith-based organizations.
- **Conducting Thematic and Qualitative Analysis for Publication:** Analyze data from over 100 interviews with community members from 18 different cultures. This analysis will help understand community-specific TB concerns and inform the development of educational materials.

About Us:

EthnoMed is a cultural bridge connecting healthcare providers and patients from refugee, immigrant, and migrant (RIM) backgrounds in King County.

Our team:

- Educates healthcare providers on clinical and cultural topics relevant to patient care.
- Provides patients with culturally and linguistically tailored health resources.
- Conducts community engagement, education, and outreach throughout Seattle and King County.
- Creates opportunities for students and medical residents to gain experience with diverse patient populations.

EthnoMed operates within Harborview Medical Center—the region's only Level 1 trauma center and home to the International Medicine Clinic, where patients speaking over 100 different languages receive care annually.
